Now in its 29th year, The Resurrection Project (TRP) is a powerful and effective social enterprise that seamlessly blends community development, community organizing, and advocacy with human service delivery to create vibrant, healthier, and involved communities. With its innovative three-pillar Community Resurrection Model, TRP empowers individuals and families by creating community ownership, building community wealth, and by serving as stewards of community assets.

In 1990, TRP began with an initial seed capital of \$30,000 from area parishes, which has since been leveraged into \$537 million in community investment.

The Imagine More Campaign provides the financial resources needed for the organization to experience targeted, accelerated growth through its core strategies and initiatives.

Where we operate and why

Last year, our reach exceeded 97,000 individuals from all over the metropolitan Chicago region. Most TRP program participants come from low-income households and 88% are Latino. Predominantly Mexican first- and second-generation immigrant households face language, cultural, economic, and educational barriers; TRP provides the support and education to help families thrive. We revitalize communities by creating economic integration, building community assets and wealth, and empowering individuals to be catalysts of change.

To build relationships and challenge people to act on their faith and values by creating community ownership, by building community wealth, and by serving as stewards of community assets.

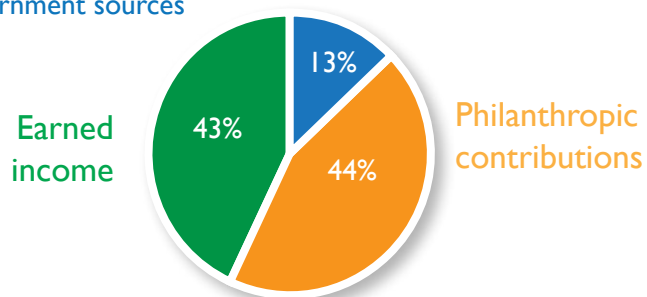
Community Resurrection Model
